Competition Topics 2015-2016

September: Open: Update Your Portfolio with New Images

- Images need to have been taken since September 2014.
- This topic encourages you to develop a new portfolio. The images could feature Spring/Summer travels, seasonal activities, or field trips. They could also feature skills that you obtained or projects you worked on over the Summer months.

October: One Foot

- The photo must include at least one foot, and the foot must be a major element in the image. The foot may be animal, human, artificial, or an abstract impression that appears to be a foot.
- Given the plasticity of the English language, there might be other plays on the definition of "foot" that a judge might find to be acceptable and indeed creative.

November: <u>Critique (TBD)</u>

December: People not portraits

- This topic encourages the photographer to explore not only people's faces but also the hands and other symbols of the subject's essence (e.g., the hands and gloves of a construction worker, a violinist's hand holding a bow or a baseball player holding a bat, the feet of a ballet dancer, etc.).
- Images may portray one person or close group of people. The primary emphasis should be on the people (e.g., on the raised hands of several basketball players, but not on the basketball). Formal portraits, indoors or outdoors, are not permissible, but a "staged candid" is acceptable.

January: Advanced: Light Modification

- This involves using something to modify light sources that illuminates the subject or reaches the camera. These can include, but are not limited to, cucolorises, snoots, colored gels, and polarizing films or polarizing filters on the camera lens.
- A cucoloris (cookie) might be something as simple as a partially open blind or a cut-out make from paper or aluminum foil.
- Learn how to use bokeh modifiers that add pizzazz to an image.
- Try optical filters for B&W.

Novice: Textures

- The texture of your subject matter should be the dominant subject.
- Textures can be bulbous, bumpy, crenellated, crinkled, rough, smocked, smooth
- Texture is NOT the same as pattern

February: <u>Critique (TBD)</u>

March: <u>Standing Out From the Crowd</u>

- The subject must be very different from all the others in a crowd. e.g., A black swan surrounded by white ones or a single object captured with flash while the other objects are blurred.
- The subject that stands out should not stand out by the use of a photo editing technique. For example in an image of a bowl of apples, it would NOT be acceptable to make all but one apple black and white whereas taking the same photo, but having one apple stand out by controlling depth of field, would be acceptable.

April: Critique (TBD)

May: Predominant Primary Color(s) or Predominant Black or White if Monochrome

· Primary colors will be defined as the additive primary colors: Blue, Green, and Red ONLY

June: End of Year Competition

Members get to vote for the photo of the year from all of the entries for the year, advanced and novice combined.

About the September Competition Judge Terry Popkin



Terry Popkin has been creating elegant images – portraits, landscapes, and commercial photography – for over three decades. His photographs and articles have been published around the world. He believes that creativity is the basis for both fine art and fine photography and that the two are inseparable. He will also discuss what types of images work better in B&W and why B&W is often a better choice for a great photo. Greg will discuss how he learns to pre-visualize images for later black & white conversion. Throughout the presentation, he will discuss the different methods he uses for converting images to B&W and at the end of the night will give a demonstration on Nik Software's Silver Effects Pro, a plug-in program used for monochrome conversions. NEW and Improved Rules

Beginning NIHCC Club Year 2015-2016 - New Competition Rules for Monochrome and Color Prints

The NIH Camera Club Board of Directors approved a change to the NIH RECREATION & WELFARE CAMERA CLUB, INTRA-CLUB COMPETITION RULES, v. 20150510. These new rules are effective immediately.

RULES CONCERNING COMPETITION OF IMAGES

Category (Image Type) Rules

Monochrome and Color Prints

- 1. Commercially produced prints may be entered. The photos may also be commercially mounted.
- 2. Maximum print size is 16×20 inches and minimum print size is 5×7 inches.
- 3. All prints must be mounted on rigid board or on mat board not larger than 24 x 30 inches. Prior to mounting, remove excess trim if the photo is printed on paper larger than the image size. The prints need to be securely attached to the mat board (top and bottom) by double sided tape or adhesive spray. If an over mat (window mat) is used, it also must be securely attached (top and bottom) to the photo's sturdy back mount. There must not be anything on the front and back of the mat that could damage another photo.
- 4. All prints entered into competition must have on the reverse side a clearly written label with the maker's name, photograph's title, and an arrow pointing to the top of the image. The photo will be shown as marked. No information may be written on the front of the image.
- 5. Photos that become dislodged from the mounting board or the label falls off will be disqualified.
- 6. All photos entered in the competition must be recorded on the provided sign in sheets, novice or advanced for each category. Name and title of the image should be printed clearly. The photos should then be placed in the correct container for novice or advanced in the appropriate category.

Digital Images (submitted to the web by the Thursday before each competition)

Image size for each competition must not exceed 1280 pixels in width and 800 pixels in height and should be in jpg format and sRGB color space, or as specified in the NIH R&W Camera Club newsletter. In the event of different specifications, the newsletter will have the correct specifications.

Files must be named as follows; class~name of maker~title (eg: **novice~John Smith~Bird**). For regular competitions, files must be sent by 8 PM the Thursday before or as the newsletter
