## PSA Rep Rap By Dick Sprott



One of the reasons that less experienced members of the club may feel that PSA is not for them is that they assume PSA is an organization for accomplished photographers who want to hone already developed skills, attend conferences and compete in national and international competitions. While those objectives can be met, there is far more information available through PSA for the novice or less experienced photographer. For example, the Tools and Techniques section of the website contains extensive pdf's describing digital cameras (16 pages), topics include sensors, file format, camera phones, bridge cameras, mirrorless interchangeable lens cameras, digital single lens cameras, dynamic range, and using a camera: lenses (13 pages), topics include theory, design of lenses, depth of field, focal length, stabilization, old lenses for digital cameras, macro lenses, and use of lenses: and accessories (16 pages), topics include camera bags and cases, close-up equipment, electronic flash, exposure meters, filters, lens hoods, monopods, and tripods. These pdf's answer most of the questions an inexperienced photographer would have on these topics and many questions even

very experienced photographers have. There is also an "ask about equipment and its use" service that can be helpful with equipment purchase decisions and clear up confusion about equipment differences. I quess I should also mention my own monthly column "PSA at Your Service" which features one to three PSA services each month. A membership in PSA is \$45/year and you get digital access to the PSA Journal (paper journal membership is \$60) and access to the PSA website. That's a lot of easily accessible info as well as access to personalized help for very little cost. As always, I'll have application cards with me at each club meeting and am always happy to chat about PSA.



## March Judge David Blecman



David Blecman, a member of t h e Professional Photographers of America, started his photographic career fresh

out of high school in 1978, and before turning twenty, he was named Photo Editor of the county newspaper. After many years of shooting weddings and such, he started Positive Negatives in 1997, and concentrated more into the commercial photography arena. He is now an internationally recognized photographer and instructor, having taught in over a dozen countries to photographers, models, and makeup artists.

He has photographed projects for such clientele as Sears, Color Me Beautiful, JC Penney, Bath & Body Works, Foot Action, Kaybee Toys, Littman Jewelers, Seagrams Americas, Holiday Inn, Wyndham Hotels, Days Inn, Hilton Hotels, The White House, Black Market, Water Water Everywhere, Cornell University, etc.

David has also been hired to photograph such celebrities as President George W. Bush, Christina Aguilera, Jimmy Buffett, Steely Dan, Moody Blues, Beyonce and Destiny's Child, Celine Dion, Gene Simmons and KISS, and numerous others.

He currently shoots for magazines, clothiers, fashion designers, and numerous other print and commercial accounts, as well as for models, actors, and their agencies. He has been published hundreds of times, and his specialties include, but is not limited to; child and adult models, architectural, food, fashion, swimwear, location and studio work, products, headshots, etc.

The <u>Photographer's Market</u>, an international publication which advises photographers on how to market their photography as well as business practices, did a feature write-up on David and Positive Negatives in the 2001 edition.

David continues to speak at modeling and photography venues, judge at pageants, teach at modeling agencies, and continues to teach and mentor photographers, models, and makeup artists internationally. His 2010 training course in the Caribbean was filmed to become a 13-episode television series.

He also organizes exotic training events in the Caribbean , Bahamas, and Europe aboard luxury cruise liners with on-board and location shooting and training, and is an advocate of helping artists grow and protect their business and careers world-wide. David helped in the planning and teaching of a photography training course for cancer patients at The St. Agnes Cancer Institute in Baltimore, MD and had a dozen camera systems donated by his friends and clients.

More recently, David is mentoring a group of over 650 amateur photographers, and is getting them exposure and recognition by having their work displayed and sold at local venues.

# **Competition Topics 2016**

#### March: Standing Out From the Crowd

- The subject must be very different from all the others in a crowd. e.g., A black swan surrounded by white ones or a single object captured with flash while the other objects are blurred.
- The subject that stands out should not stand out by the use of a photo editing technique. For example in an image of a bowl of apples, it would NOT be acceptable to make all but one apple black and white whereas taking the same photo, but having one apple stand out by controlling depth of field, would be acceptable.

## May: <u>Predominant Primary Color(s) or Predominant Black or White if</u> Monochrome

• Primary colors will be defined as the additive primary colors: Blue, Green, and Red ONLY

# Longwood Gardens Orchid Extravaganza by Jim Turner Monday March 7, 2016

Our next joint NIHCC/SSCC midweek meet-up will be on Monday March 7, 2016, to Longwood Gardens for their annual Orchid Extravaganza (http:// longwoodgardens.org/). The orchids are on display indoors in the Conservatory. "Longwood's Orchid Display is a living

# California Landscapes

Last September, my wife and I decided to take a driving tour of the eastern part of California – east of the Sierra Nevada Mountains. We covered 2000 miles in 10 days in our rental car. Our whirlwind tour included Mono Lake, the Ancient Bristlecone Pine Forest, Manzanar War Relocation Center, Death Valley, and Joshua Tree National Park.

Mono Lake is located just east of Yosemite. Because the lake has no outlet and is fed by freshwater streams, the salts and minerals from the streams accumulate over the centuries to form tall tufa towers. My images were taken just prior to and during sunrise. While driving to Mono Lake, I was amazed at how dark it was, and I was excited to see so many stars including the Milky Way galaxy so clearly for the first time in my life.





The Ancient Bristlecone Pine Forest was my favorite place to visit. It is located 10,000 feet above sea level in the White Mountains in the Inyo National Forest. The forest contains the oldest trees in the world. The growth rate of the bristlecone pine is extremely slow – 1 inch in diameter in 100 years. Due to the cold, dry environment, and with few insects, wood decomposes very slowly. Some areas of the forest contain groves of bristlecone pine ranging in age up to 5000 years old.





The Manzanar War Relocation Center is located at the base of Mount Whitney. It was one of 10 relocation centers where Japanese-Americans were sent during World War II. Manzanar had a particularly significant meaning to me because my father and his family spent time there. Fortunately, I was born after that episode. Because this trip was to be about landscapes, I took a picture of a monument in the Manzanar cemetery with Mount Whitney in the background. The image was intentionally shot to mimic the famous photograph entitled, "Monument in Cemetery, Manzanar Relocation Center, California," by Ansel Adams (1943).



Death Valley National Park was my next favorite place to visit this trip – even in 117 degree F heat. It is filled with many different types of stunning landscapes. We visited Zabriskie Point, another favorite location for Hollywood movies. It is noted for its erosional landscapes. The sunset in Death Valley was the most intense I had ever experienced. We were in the Panamint Range when we experienced the intensity of the reddish-purple sunset.





Lastly, we visited Joshua Tree National Park where two deserts come together: the Colorado Desert from the east and the Mojave Desert from the west. The park is noted for its large, surreal granite boulders and rock outcroppings as well as its Joshua trees.
