PSA Rep Rap

Last month I asked for your help in providing information for an application for a PSA Service Award I would like to submit to PSA on behalf of our club. Please check the June issue of Cameraderie for details. I really could use your help!

This month I have a similar request. The PSA Journal occasionally features the activities of a club in a Focus article. For those who are PSA Members, check your February 2016 issue of the Journal, either the hard copy or on Line to see a Focus article about the Saint Paul Camera Club. The article is a very good outline of how this article should be constructed. The article starts with a history of a club, then describes its activities and size. Finally, the article should highlight club activities that benefit the community. We could get that activity from the Service Award application if we actually prepare one. I have a copy of a beginning document "A Day in the Life of..." which I think was written by Saul Pleeter and others? I would like to use this document as the start of this article with Saul's permission.

Why bother? The Saint Paul Club reports that they got lots of attention from the Journal article and used it to attract new members. They put copies of the February issue (provided by PSA) on a table by one of their exhibitions so that prospective members could read about their club.



Club Service Awards are presented in recognition of photography service efforts made by PSA-member clubs in communities worldwide. The award recognizes clubs participation in photographic projects of a civic nature such as town or area publicity, welfare and charity fund-raising, historical documentation, animal adoption, nature conservancy, community promotion, free holiday or event portraits, and education in the art and craft of photography. There is a minimum waiting period of three years between receiving successive PSA Service Awards for Clubs.

PSA Service Awards for Clubs

In the proposal for a PSA Club Service Award the Proposer should include:

- the length of time (number of years) the club has participated in the activity,
- the number of members in the club,
- and the number of club members that are involved in the activity.

Service that does not involve photography can be included in the proposal, but the importance of this service would be less than photographic service.

For a Club Service Award the Proposer may also include supporting documents not to exceed three pages. Supporting documents might be, for example, newspaper publicity, documentation showing the involvement of the club, an event program, a *PSA Journal* article, or record photographs of club service events.

"Fells Point Fireworks" Stan Collyer

(1st place Color Print)

Baltimore's Fort McHenry Bicentennial celebration gave me an opportunity to try photographing fireworks for the first time. I found that it wasn't terribly difficult technically, but the right location is important. It's nice to have something interesting in the foreground and/or background. I was fortunate to have access to a balcony on a condo overlooking the inner harbor, where I could see fireworks coming from three barges simultaneously. This was shot using a tripod and a cable release, at 16mm, f/2.8, 1/13 sec, ISO 1600.



"Study in Texture 1" Gosia Klosek

(2nd place Color Print)

I picked up three scarves made of fabric with different colors and textures. I was experimenting with their arrangements one evening, illuminating the room with a 60W desk lamp, but not shining the light directly on the scarfs. The scene was in relative darkness, hence the camera set up with a long exposure. To make every part of the fabric in focus I stacked together 3 images (using Hugin software), taken at the same camera exposure settings (set manually) and manually changing the focus. Nikon 190mm ISO200 3s f8

"Street Scene" Stan Collyer (3rd place Color Print)

When photographing street scenes, I enjoy finding interesting backdrops, then standing back and waiting for something to happen. In Havana there's no shortage of colorful and unusual backgrounds, and it didn't take long for these two young ladies to show up. Shot at 23mm, f/8, 1/250 sec, ISO 400.





"Icelandic Horses" Kay Norvell

(1st place Monochrome Print)

This image was taken on a windy spring day at a horse farm in rural NE Iceland. Conversion to B/W was made with Lightroom and Nik plugin. Nikon 7100, 300mm, 1/640, f/5.6, ISO200.

"Desert Shadows" Kay Norvell (2nd place Monochrome Print)

This image was taken in Morocco in the Sahara Desert from camel back. I was on a camel in the second group and photographed the first group with shadows. Conversion to B/W was made with Lightroom and Nik plugin. Nikon D7100, 18mm, 1/640, f/16, ISO50.





"Shade and Shades" Gosia Klosek

(3rd place Monochrome Print)

This photo shows a pleated lampshade lit by sun rays coming through slits of window shades. A position of the sun and a location of the neighbor's house casting a shadow, resulted in triangular brightly lit areas. This effect didn't last long. The judged correctly guessed the subject of this semiabstract geometrical image. After turning the image to black and white, I used the curves function in Gimp to make dark areas darker and light areas lighter.

Nikon ISO100, 1/10 sec f/20 150mm



"Lonesome Penguin" John Norvell (1st place Digital)

This image was made in Antarctica on a Lindblad tour last February. We landed on a foggy day and I walked up the ridge to get a photo of the bay and penguin colony. Luckily, the fog began clearing and one penguin walked up to a large rock in front of me and looked toward the penguin colony. In spite of the name, this lone penguin was probably just looking for a way to get back to the colony. Fuji X-T1, 70mm, 1/160, f/11, ISO 800.



"Desert Colors" Kay Norvell (2nd place Digital)

This photo was made at sunset in the Sahara Desert when the shadows emphasized the sand formations. Nikon D7100, 140mm. 1/500, f/5.6, ISO400.



"Spring Rain" John Norvell

(3rd place Digital)

I took this photo from my car in a spring rain. I leaned against the driver's door and focused on the opposite window, leaving the colorful trees and grass out of focus. Nikon D610, 120mm, 1/40, f/8, ISO 1000.

Taking Your Picture Finding your Style; Finding your Subject

I write and edit photography books. I'm interested in how photography shapes reality, how photographs work when juxtaposed and in sequences to enrich a subject and tell a layered story, and how words and photographs can enlarge each other (and why they don't always). I find the possibilities for photo books endless. I love all the ways to collaborate – with photographers, with designers, and with researchers.

My most recent book, published in Fall 2015 by Prestel in cooperation with the Library of Congress, tells the story of a unique photo collective and its mission to photograph America. The name of the collective, *Facing Change: Documenting America*, is the title of the book.

Prestel also published *SIBERIA: In the Eyes of Russian Photographers* (October 2013). For this book I compared photographs of Siberia by Russians with photos by outsiders and I considered the implications of the differences and similarities. My book and accompanying exhibition allowed me to bring Russian photographs made between the 1860s and 2011 to public awareness in the U.S. for the first time.

My other books include *Song Without Words*, the photographs and diaries of Leo Tolstoy's wife, Sophia; *Propaganda & Dreams*, photography made

in the U.S.S.R. compared with photographs made in the U.S. during the 1930s; and *Stories on Paper &*



Glass, a history of National Geographic photography spanning more than a century.

I was Director of Photography Publishing for National Geographic Books from 1990 through 2009. In 2010 I was invited to join the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars as a Senior Scholar. I spent three years there doing historical research for my Siberia project.

Among the many books I edited for National Geographic, two made the New York Times Best Seller list: *Image Collection* (2009) and *Through the Lens* (2000).

I curated exhibitions for the Corcoran Gallery of Art, Washington DC, the Pushkin Museum of Art, Moscow, and the American University Museum of Art, Washington, D.C.

There is a lot of important photography being done now, a lot out there to care about. I'm influenced by what I see online and in print and, personally, in the photography bookmaking workshops I teach. leah.BendavidVal@gmail.com



Leah Bendavid-Val is former Director of Photography Publishing, National Geographic Books, and a Senior Scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. She is the author of seven books on photography.

2016-2017 NIHCC Competition Schedule

September: Six Month Open – Images must be taken after March 1, 2016. Can be any subject. This topic encourages people to develop a new portfolio and participate in or lead upcoming club field trips. The images could feature Spring, summer travels or seasonal activities. It could also feature skills that you obtained or projects you worked on over the summer months.

October:	<i>Water - Images in which the principal subject is water (anything from droplets to oceans), either stationary or in motion.</i>
November:	Critique/Poster Session
December:	Abstract Patterns/Textures - Images in which the object being photographed is not readily identifiable.
<u>January:</u>	<i>Macros -</i> Close-up images of any object(s), created with or without a macro lens.
February:	Open – Can be any subject
<u>March:</u>	Urban Images - Images depicting scenes in an urban environment (e.g., buildings, roads, vehicles, etc.), either with or without people.
April:	Night Scenes - Images of anything obviously taken after dark.
<u>May:</u>	Critique/Poster Session
June:	Photo of the Year Competition
