Well, here we are in a New Year. Let's hope 2017 is less stressful than 2016. One way to strive for less stress is to give yourself the time and permission to do some of what you really want to do, not just what you must do. I am reminded of that truth by a wonderful book I received as a gift for Christmas "Birds, Art, and Design", by Larry Barth. Barth describes his inspiration and views on art as more important than his incredible sculptural ability. It is his love of art that drives him to produce wonderful sculptures of the birds he treasures. Some of you may have seen some of his absolutely incredible bird sculptures in Ocean City or Salisbury, MD at exhibitions that many of us receive notices of. I have only very rarely been moved so profoundly by any book and only once before by a book on how to make art. Those who took my intro photo courses know of the importance of Robert Henri's "The Art Spirit" to my photography and my views on how to develop one's own artistic identity. Larry Barth lives only an hour's drive or so from my cabin in central PA, so I fully intend to visit him and his studio as soon as I can arrange it. That is my only option after reading an extraordinary book with marvelous photographs of his work, done by a variety of photographers. The photography is essential to this book though it is just a given, not featured.

So, what has this to do with PSA? Not a heck of a lot to be frank, but I can't resist challenging you to think hard about what you really want to say with your photography and how you can best say it. If PSA and its great array of mentors and counselors can be of help to you in any way, then your membership can be worth what it costs you. PSA is only useful if you make it so. People who remain as PSA members are those who make use of PSA's resources and find a way to get involved. Politicians will come and go, elections will come and go. The person you see in the mirror every morning is here to stay for as long as you live. Be true to that self. Get in touch with what moves you and find a way to express it with your camera. Taking pictures for competition can be fun, but shooting for judges is not where your soul is. Spend some time looking inside your head and "make, not take" images that move you.





1st Place Digital: Dan Smith "Sand Pattern in Pink (at Big Sur)"

Initially, most of my photos taken while hiking were landscapes. After a while, I learned the principle that some of the best photos are found when I look at my feet. Here, there was some pink anomaly in the geology of the sand, creating an abstract pattern as the waves washed over it. Outflow is to the right. Taken in full sun at 4:30 PM in late May. Details: f/6.3, 1/400 exposure, 80 ISO, 6 mm. focal length. Panasonic Lumix (DMC-LF1). Very little post-processing.





2nd Place Digital: Diane J Poole "Church"

This image was taken at an Abandoned Institution called Forest Haven. Iphone 6s and an app called photostudio

3rd Place Digital: Gosia Klosek "Strokes"


This is an image of a glass dish with a flat carved bottom and colored paper placed underneath. In post-processing, I've added greens and blues using the BucketFill tool in Gimp – reds and yellows are as shot, and distorted perspective elongates the lines. Nikon 200mm 4.0sec f / 20 ISO 200



HM Digital: Nathanael Lee "Philadelphia Magic"

This photo was shot while I was visiting downtown Philly this summer for the first time. Taken with a Sony, 24mm, ISO100, 1/160s, f/4.5.

HM Digital: Diane J Poole "Jacks or Better"

I took this photo of plastic colored Jacks using my iphone 6s. I then used an app called distortion to make it appear more abstract.

Competition Winners (Advanced)



1st Place Digital: Stan Collyer "Stained Glass Streaks"

On a trip to New Orleans I visited one of their famous cemeteries (St. Louis Cemetery #3) where there was a small mausoleum with a stained glass window. Light was streaming through the window and creating a colorful pattern on the floor. I enhanced it somewhat in Lightroom and Photoshop to create this look. Shot at f/8.0, 1/80 sec., 70 mm, ISO 200.



2nd Place Digital: John Telford "Swirls"

This is a natural light reflection on a lake surface in Utah. Taken with a Nikon D4 and a Nikon 70-200 f2.8 at 165mm, f8, 1/200sec, and ISO 200.

A surreal look was added in post.



3rd Place Digital: Jim Turner "Skyline Trees"

This picture was taken from an overlook along Skyline Drive. I liked the look of the bare white trees but the actual picture didn't look so great so I processed it in Topaz Glow 2 to get this image. Nikon 70-300 f/4.5-5.6G at 1/125s, f/11, ISO 250.

HM Digital: Kay Norvell "Fez a la Turner"

The original image of sunset of Fez, Morocco showed lots of golden hues, but the Topaz plug-in created a blurry view of the city neighborhoods. Nikon D7100, 100mm, 1/80 sec, f/16, ISO 200





1st Place B&W Print Stan Collyer "Mosque Abstract"

This image was created at the Diyanet Center of America, in Lanham MD. It's part of the decoration on the ceiling in one of the rooms. I altered it slightly using a plugin called Topaz Simplify. It was shot at f/8.0, 1/100 sec., 70 mm, ISO 1600. D610, at 1/3 second, f/ 16, and 120mm focal length.





2nd Place B&W Print: John Norvell "Leaves and Ice"

The image of bright red fall leaves on top of ice-covered pebbles made an interesting photo. But I liked the B&W version, especially after increasing the contrast of the ice, lowering the exposure of the dark leaves, an using the Topaz plug-in to liquify the image. Nikon D610, 85mm, 1/200 sec, f/11, ISO 400

3rd Place B&W Print: Gosia Klosek "Stack"

I noticed a stack of white plates. Plates, apparently from different manufacturers, were of different thicknesses and had somewhat different curvatures, so the shadows in between were of different depths. I cropped off the edges to draw attention to the series of lines, inverted colors to make it a more abstract, and adjusted the white balance to create this image. Nikon 300mm 3.0 sec f/16 ISO 200





HM B&W Print: David Terao "Emergence""

This is a close-up image of soap film (e.g., soap solution for blowing bubbles) stretched over wire formed into a circle. Shot with a Canon 5D Mk III and 100mm/2.8 macro lens. Exposure was 1/160 sec @ f/5.6 and ISO 3200. Converted to B&W with Nik/Google Silver Efex.



1st Place Color Print: George Lea "Application to Barbizon School" (where French Impressionism started in 19th Century)

Image captured in Kruku National Park, Croatia; a leaf floating in a pond during late October. Sony a7-R, Leitz 35mm f2.0 Summicron, B+W circular Polarizer, f5.6, ISO 200, RAW, X-rite grey card for whote point calibration Adobe PsCC, multiple blend layers with various opacity settings to produce a high-key effect. The polarizer helped to control reflections off the water surface and bring up the muted tones. Orginial printed on Red River Canvas paper.




2nd Place Color Print: Gosia Klosek "Inspired by Rothko"

The sunset was too vivid to seem real: thin layers of clouds were bright red, a thick layer of clouds was black, and in between a strip of blue sky was visible. I inverted the colors, increased the brightness and saturation of the yellow (formerly blue), and extended the canvas size to smudge the edges as I remembered them in Rothko's paintings (Rothko did it differently, but inspired me to try this effect). Nikon 300 mm 1/320 sec f/ 8.0 ISO 320



3rd Place Color Print John Norvell "Zebra Zoom"

I made this image of a mounted zebra at the Smithsonian by zooming in during a slow shutter exposure. Then I brightened the colors and used Topaz plug-in to create an impressionistic image with the zebra barely recognized. Fuji X-T1, 30mm, 1/4 sec, f/4, ISO 380



HM Color Print: Stan Collyer "Mosaic"

This image started out as a photograph of an actual mosaic created by the Spanish architect Antonio Gaudi, which is in one of his fantastic and whimsical houses in Barcelona (Casa Batllo). I then modified it in various ways, especially by using the Liquify filter in Photoshop. Taken at f/8, ISO 400, 50mm, 1/200 sec.



HM Color Print: Jim Turner "Virginia Woods"

Virginia Woods. This picture was taken in the woods near Roanoke VA. I processed it in Topaz Glow 2 to get this look. Nikon 24-85 f/ 3.5-4.5G at 1/6s, f/16, ISO 100.




























January Judge Meryl Silver
