#### Maureen Garder-"Sending Ripples"

This photo makes me happy. I feel lucky to have spotted its potential on a sandy path leading to Bethany Beach at midday in October. I love how the shadow ripples make the sand look like it's moving like waves on the ocean, and the texture of the sand. The judge said "Well this is a clever image. I think it is really well-seen by the photographer; it is an unusual view of sand." He recommended cropping a bit off the left and I do like it better. Settings: F10, 1/640 sec, 24mm (equivalent), ISO 200.



David Terao-"Tinplate Pueblo"

The image I submitted for critique was more of an experiment in using some advanced techniques in Photoshop. The image of a heating, ventilation and air-conditioning (HVAC) unit was a good subject for using these techniques. I pass this swim center every morning while walking my dog and always wondered whether the HVAC unit sitting on the roof would make an interesting photograph. The HVAC unit reminded of an old pueblo building sitting on a cliff ledge. It might not win any awards in a camera club competition, but it was a fun project!



#### John Norvell-

We went to Shenandoah and walked through the Big Meadows, photographing the beautiful colors. But this was across the street, next to the ranger building. Taken with my Fuji and standard lens zoomed to telephoto.



#### Karen Goldman-"Lotus Flower Blooming"

This image was taken in July 2017 at Kenilworth Park & Aquatic Gardens, in Washington, D.C. Nikon D7200, 300mm, f/5.6, 1/800s, ISO 200.

I think Roy may have suggested trying it in B&W and thought it was a mid-level image. What I had hoped was that he would comment about whether it fit the PSA definition for a photo travel image but I could not ask him that so I'm still not sure. The definition is that the Photo Travel image expresses the characteristic features or culture of a land as they are found naturally. But I did learn that it is not a really great shot.

The Judge said this image was awkward, and uninteresting. Its ok to disagree!!! I personally really loved everything that he did not like about it.

## **Dick Sprott-PSA Representitive**

Dick Sprott is a Ph.D. Behavior Geneticist who spent 15 years at the Jackson Laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine before moving to Bethesda to head the Biology of Aging Division of the National Institute on Aging. During that time he obtained an Associate Degree in Photography at Montgomery College and taught photography at the National Institutes of Health for 14 years. During those years he earned Master status in the NIH Camera Club and served as its president for 5 years. He served as NIHCC president again in 2013-2014. He is a graduate of the PSA Image Evaluation Course which used to certify PSA judges and has judged for area camera clubs



and the PSA Mid-Atlantic Chapter of the Photographic Society of America (PSA). He is a long time member of PSA where he serves on numerous committees, is the Area Membership Chair for the Mid-Atlantic Area, and served as co-chair of the PSA website contest for many years.

His photographic "philosophy" is based on the fact that he has always been a visual responder. Throughout his career as a 'bench scientist' he was only able to understand data after he converted it to graphic form. Tables of numbers did nothing for him. As a scientist, he derived his greatest satisfaction from creating order out of complexity. In his next career as a scientific administrator, he found satisfaction by solving complex problems with many of the same skills he used in the laboratory. But how does one 'see' an elegant administrative result?

The creation of a fine picture requires the same compulsive skills in the darkroom or digitally as are required in the lab and the same organizing vision to create the image as is required when solving other complex problems. It also requires that the maker put some real part of him or herself into the image. As a bonus, the end product is visible to oneself and to others. Success or failure is there for everyone to see.

## **Suzanne Taylor Dater-Social Chair**

As a child my father inspired me to love nature and animal life but I did not personally get really close to it as an art form until many years later when I took up riding and competed in equestrian sports of dressage, eventing, and field hunting, which led me to becoming Chairman of the Potomac Dressage Association and Manager of numerous national equestrian events. <u>11/10/2020-STREET PHOTOGRAPHY</u>- The great spectacle of life on the streets or public places, people doing what they are supposed to do, being people. Henri Cartier Bresson talked about "the decisive moment". Your images should tell a story be it events of daily life, activities, festivals, hanging out, begging, playing music in public. It is unacceptable to misrepresent the truth by manipulating or altering the subject matter or situation or by "staging" for the purpose of photography.

#### 12/8/2020-Holiday Party Potluck

<u>1/12/2021-HOLIDAYS</u>- The photos entered should clearly be identifiable as a particular holiday (Christmas, Ramadan, Kwanzaa, Chanukah, Holi with bright colors thrown around, Lunar New Year, etc). There are many holidays and it may not be possible for everyone to be familiar with each and the various traditions but your photograph should tell a story. Entries should try to portray these. Personal events such as birthdays and weddings are not permitted, nor are meals in an ethnic restaurant.

<u>2/9/2021-RED AND BLUE STATES</u>- The elections are over, the President is sworn in and all is said and done. Red and blue are colors but states can be referred to as "red" or "blue" as well. They can also refer to states of emotion (think about feeling blue, a red cape waved at a bull). Entries should clearly reflect one of these interpretations of "red" or "blue." If you choose to interpret the entry as a "US State" there should be something clearly identifiable about that State in your image (For example, a Texas rodeo, something identifiable in California that would make it "blue" assuming it remains that way). Entries may include one or both "colors."

<u>3/9/2021-SPORTS</u>- Sports involve motion as well as emotion and entries should clearly reflect that. Sports can include professional or non-professional sports, youth sports, or personal sports (yoga, working out). Entries may include motion with motion blur or be static and could be solo or group sports. For this competition, video games, gambling, slot machines, etc. do not meet the definition.

<u>4/13/2021-WATER IN ALL ITS FORMS</u>- Images may depict ice, water or vapor, snow, rain such as waterfalls, icebergs, clouds, or rivers. Seascapes could be used so long as the water is the main focus of the image. Images in which the principal subject is water (anything from droplets to oceans), either stationary or in motion are valid. Although people in the image are acceptable, they should not be the dominant feature.

<u>5/11/2021-TREES</u>-Trees-Any image including a detail of a tree or a whole tree is acceptable so long as it is recognizable as a tree or part of a tree. The "hand of man" may be included so long as it is not the dominant element of the image. Products of trees such as paper and furniture do not qualify.

- Enter the title of the image in the text box and click the <Choose File> button to select your image.

- You will have to follow this procedure twice, once for your color entries and once for you monochrome entries

Karen is contributing two images, "Hippos in Dried-Up Pool" and "Distressed Hippos in Drought," both taken in 2016 during a drought in the Serengeti, Tanzania. Hippopotamuses had congregated in a shrinking pool of water reduced to mud and the animals' waste. The degraded conditions and crowding are stressful for the hippos, and also harm fish and other water-dependent species. Droughts are becoming more frequent due to climate change.

## **Better Query Saul** Free Presets for Lightroom

In previous BQS columns, I discussed presets, brushes and actions that essentially are shortcuts for adjustments to your photographs. Instead of starting the post-processing in Lightroom with sliders in neutral (middle) position, presets allow you a base or initial adjustment from which you can fine-tune your adjustments. For example, the first photo is almost straight our-of-camera (the only adjustment was to level the horizon)



I then went to my Presets panel and selected a preset called Blue Hour with the following result:



As can be seen in the right-hand panel of the screen shot below, almost all of the slider adjustments were changed:



There are many, many presets that are on-line for free. There also are free brushes and actions - but I will tackle those in another column. One set of presets that I like very much is from Serge Ramelli. His website is <a href="https://www.photoserge.com/pl001a-free-toolbox">https://www.photoserge.com/pl001a-free-toolbox</a>. Expect to provide your email address and receive some information about his classes and tutorials that he sells. The presets range from Basic, Black and While, Blue Hour, Golden Hour, and Sunset. To install these presets click on the plus (+) sign next to **Presets** in the Develop window, then choose add presets. Locate the presets that you want to import and click enter.

Another set of free **Presets** that I like is provided by ON1. Go to <u>ON1.com</u>, locate the Free Tab at the very top, go down to find **Free Presets and LUTs**. Basically, a **LUT** (Look Up Table) is like a Preset except that it adjusts a reduced set of parameters -color and tone. A **Preset**, typically adjusts a much wider range of image parameters, things like exposure, sharpening and vignetting. **LUTs** can boost colors, change moods, make subtle or dramatic changes in the appearance of your photos.

## Famous Photographers By Stephen Levitas #54 October 2020

David Goldblatt (1930-2018)





South African photographer David Goldblatt passed away just two years ago. Through the times of apartheid, he photographed the context and conditions that created apartheid, although not overt apartheid, leading his contemporaries to opine that he lacked commitment, whereas he felt he was pursuing the same goal, but more subtly. His work is represented in museum collections throughout the world; he has had major exhibitions; and he has published several books of documentary photographs.

Throughout his years as a photographer, Goldblatt never saw himself as an artist, and he was uncomfortable being seen as one. Many agree that he was a documentarian more than he was an artist. Goldblatt had an innovative approach to documentary photography. *He made a life of photographing the issues that went beyond the events of apartheid and documented the conditions that led to them* [italics mine].Goldblatt was never comfortable with the fine art world. He went to exhibition openings but secretly hated the attention they threw upon him. He got around the label of artist by simply calling himself a photographer. He said: "I am a self-appointed observer and critic of the society into which I was born, with a tendency to giving recognition to what is overlooked or unseen."

Goldblatt's photography was not obviously politically charged. He claimed he was not an activist, unlike the majority of his friends and other photographers during this time. He in turn was looked down upon and disrespected for not involving himself in activism, on which he commented: "I wasn't prepared to compromise what I regarded as my particular needs."

During Apartheid, Goldblatt in his work *The Transported of KwaNdebele* documented the excruciatingly long and uncomfortable twice-daily bus journeys of black workers who lived in the segregated "homelands" northeast of Pretoria. The conditions had not changed that much for workers by 2007: "The bulk of people who live there still have to travel to Pretoria by road. It's still a very long commute for them every day – two to eight hours. . . . It will take generations to undo the consequences of Apartheid."

In the work Goldblatt created during apartheid he never photographed in colour. Goldblatt observed that: "the use of colour during apartheid would have been inappropriate. It would have enhanced the beautiful and the personal, whereas black and white photographs … more effectively documented the external dramatic contradictions that defined this earlier period."

After apartheid, Goldblatt continued to photograph within South Africa, particularly its landscapes.

I cannot find the title or story of this image.



This poignant image speaks for itself. Note the excellent use of available side-lighting from the window.

This is an image of the rigors of commuting long distances on public transportation in order to get to/from work, when the races are drastically separated.



We have a chance here to see the image as shot, and a cropped version of a nearly identical shot. Which do you prefer to tell the burden of apartheid on commuting workers?
