


Which brings me to the 2021 PSA Photo Festival in Rapid City South Dakota (SD). The main portion of the festival takes place October 6 to 9, with tours on October 4 and 5 before the official opening. Opportunities to visit SD don't come along every day. SD does really exist (so does North Dakota, I've been to both), so it is worth thinking seriously about attending this festival. You could fly to Rapid City of course, but why not think big? Driving to SD gives you an opportunity to see parts of the country up close that you may not have seen before. For example how can anyone pass up the Corn Palace in Mitchell, SD? Or Wall Drug in Wall, SD?

These are iconic tourist Americana spots that are advertised along the roads for hundreds of miles before you get to them. But the real attractions are the scenic parks, monuments and wildlife refuges along the way. Wall, SD is at the entrance to the Badlands National Park and has decent motels and restaurants in addition to the huge emporium that is Wall Drug. Beyond Rapid City, a short drive into Wyoming you can visit Devil's Tower National Monument, where portions of the movie Close Encounters of the Third Kind were filmed. The

monument is interesting and offers nice hikes and the surrounding area is gorgeous.

Okay, I know you think I have probably lost my marbles during the pandemic. The drive from Bethesda to Rapid City is about 1600 miles and would take about 25 hours if one drove straight through, but why would you do that? However, you could fly part way, for example to Chicago, Milwaukee or Minneapolis, and rent a car there, saving all that driving in the east and giving time for photography in the upper mid-west. A trip like that would take some time and cost more than flying to Rapid City, but how likely are you to visit the area again? Warning, though, this part of the country can be addictive. Margaret and I have been there several times and always find something new to photograph.

<u>September - Critique -</u> The critiquer will address the question "Would this image do well in a competition and why or why not?" Those who are entering the Mid Atlantic Photo Visions competition might find this especially useful!

October - Open - Any subject matter qualifies

<u>November - Nature -</u> Pictures that portray different kinds of and/or various aspects of natural plant and animal life in a living state, that illustrate the natural features of land and sea or that reveal certain natural phenomena, such as cloud formations, light refractions (sunsets, auroras, etc.) precipitation, frost, fire, but which do not show the hand of man, such as buildings, fences, beer cans, etc.

December - Holiday Party

<u>January- Repetition-</u> Pictures in which an element or a theme is repeated within the frame. The objects or actions that are repeated should be identical or sufficiently nearly identical such that the sense of a repeating activity, pattern, or object is central to the photo. Examples might include architectural elements (such as an Islamic screen), formal gardens with repeating structures, abstracts, or even human activities (such as two people engaged in a very similar action at the same time). The repeating element must be the subject of the image.

<u>February-Love</u> - Images that bring to mind or demonstrate love in any of its expressions. For example: romantic love, brotherly or sisterly love, love of country, love of money, love of (or among) animals, and so forth. Be creative and have fun!

<u>March - Selective Focus -</u> Pictures in which the viewer's attention is directed to a primary focal point within the image. This is usually accomplished by separating the primary subject from its background or surroundings, as in using shallow depth of field so that only the main subject is rendered in sharp focus.

<u>April - Abstract -</u> Qualified entries are non-representational. They may cover any subject matter; any technique or techniques may be used in their creation. The main emphasis is on pattern, texture, tone, form, color, etc. However, abstracts may contain identifiable subject matter as a minor element. An abstract image may be "found", like a certain paving pattern, or "created," like smoke wisps or light painting.

<u>May - Wide Angle -</u> Images that have a wider view (roughly 65 degrees or more) than our normal view (roughly 50 degrees). Technically, images taken with lenses with focal lengths less than 50 mm for 35 mm cameras or the equivalent lenses for other formats and sensors.

Famous Photographers By Stephen Levitas

#62 June 2021 Cameraderie Charles Marville (1813-1879)





My French is poor, but here is the best I can do for the pronunciation of Charles Marville's name: shahrl mahrvheel'.

Marville's bio in Wikipedia is surprisingly brief, so here is most of it:

Charles Marville, the pseudonym of Charles François Bossu (Paris 17 July 1813 – 1 June 1879 Paris), was a French photographer, who mainly photographed architecture, landscapes and the urban environment. He used both paper and glass negatives. He is most well known for taking pictures of ancient Parisian quarters before they were destroyed and rebuilt under "Haussmannization", Baron Haussmann's new plan for modernization of Paris. In 1862, he was named official photographer of Paris.

Bossu was born in 1813 in Paris. Coming from an "established" Paris family, he trained as a painter, illustrator and engraver. He assumed the pseudonym Charles Marville around 1832, and began working in his field. After 17 years, as an illustrator, he took up photography around 1850.

The Metropolitan Museum of New York City presented an exhibit in 2014 of Marville's work, and in its introduction gave an excellent discussion of how Marville documented the rapid rebuilding of nearly all of Paris under the direction of Emperor Napoleon III and his chief urban planner, Baron Georges-Eugène Haussmann (ref. "Haussmannization" of Paris). Please read the introduction and look at the images (with individual photographic and historical explanations) at this link:

I would normally recommend you to Google "Marville" and select "Images" to see more—please do if you wish —but the Met exhibit link makes this largely unnecessary. Below, I will show and discuss several themes of Marville's work, all from the Met exhibit.

Marville mastered using oblique natural lighting to bring out three-dimensional surfaces. Here are a couple of examples.








Now let's relate photography to art. One of my favorite paintings is Gustave Caillebotte's Paris Street, Rainy Day, 1877, a few years after some of Marville's Paris street photography of lamppost images. Can we agree that Marville's images may have had an influence on Caillebotte? I frequently cite this painting as a precedent for later photography that divides images in half, but in this case the lamppost subject may have been established by Marville. One can at least play with the idea of the connection—Caillebotte must surely have seen Marville's photographs, cotemporary to his time.



Note Caillebotte's extreme perspective views on the left side of his painting. Perspective study by artists have been around for a long time, so we can't credit Marville with teaching Caillebotte anything about perspective, but Marville's many Paris street perspectives may have still been source material for Caillebotte. 
