

PSA Rep Rap Summer 2021 By Dick Sprott






Photo Competitions

How To Photograph Amazing Water Droplets - Dale Lewis

I have been a member of the NIH Camera Club since 2015, when I joined the group in the advanced category. I submitted photographs to the NIH In-Focus Photo Contest from 2011 - 2015 and won several awards. I have photographed weddings, wedding showers, engagements, anniversary celebrations, banquets, Baby Showers, Graduations, Funerals, Sports, and scientific conferences. I enjoy night, long exposure, nature, macro and highspeed photography. I am often asked when I started taking photos. I have owned cameras for a long time, but it was not until my sons were born that I put more effort in photography to capture images of them daily. During tonight's workshop I will share with you the set-up, materials, equipment, and techniques of photographing water droplets. You should be able to photograph water droplets after my presentation.

<u>September - Critique -</u> The critiquer will address the question "Would this image do well in a competition and why or why not?" Those who are entering the Mid Atlantic Photo Visions competition might find this especially useful! (Judge-Ed Palaszynski)

<u>October - Open -</u> Any subject matter qualifies (Judge- Wayne Wolfersberger)

<u>November - Nature -</u> Pictures that portray different kinds of and/or various aspects of natural plant and animal life in a living state, that illustrate the natural features of land and sea or that reveal certain natural phenomena, such as cloud formations, light refractions (sunsets, auroras, etc.) precipitation, frost, fire, but which do not show the hand of man, such as buildings, fences, beer cans, etc. (Judge-Martin Heavner)

December - Holiday Party

<u>January- Repetition-</u> Pictures in which an element or a theme is repeated within the frame. The objects or actions that are repeated should be identical or sufficiently nearly identical such that the sense of a repeating activity, pattern, or object is central to the photo. Examples might include architectural elements (such as an Islamic screen), formal gardens with repeating structures, abstracts, or even human activities (such as two people engaged in a very similar action at the same time). The repeating element must be the subject of the image. (Judge-Cynthia Keith)

<u>February-Love</u> - Images that bring to mind or demonstrate love in any of its expressions. For example: romantic love, brotherly or sisterly love, love of country, love of money, love of (or among) animals, and so forth. Be creative and have fun! (Judge-Mike Thomas)

<u>March - Selective Focus -</u> Pictures in which the viewer's attention is directed to a primary focal point within the image. This is usually accomplished by separating the primary subject from its background or surroundings, as in using shallow depth of field so that only the main subject is rendered in sharp focus. (Judgee-Irene Hinke-Sacilotto)

<u>April - Abstract -</u> Qualified entries are non-representational. They may cover any subject matter; any technique or techniques may be used in their creation. The main emphasis is on pattern, texture, tone, form, color, etc. However, abstracts may contain identifiable subject matter as a minor element. An abstract image may be "found", like a certain paving pattern, or "created," like smoke wisps or light painting. (Judge-Mary Louise Ravese)

<u>May - Wide Angle -</u> Images that have a wider view (roughly 65 degrees or more) than our normal view (roughly 50 degrees). Technically, images taken with lenses with focal lengths less than 50 mm for 35 mm cameras or the equivalent lenses for other formats and sensors. (Judge-Roz Kleffman)







Famous Photographers By Stephen Levitas

#63 July/ August 2021 Cameraderie Tina Modotti (1896-1942)







- 1. Edward Weston's student, model, assistant, and collaborator.
- 2. Photographer.
- 3. Actress.
- 4. Political activist.

According to the Wikipedia article:

Between 1924 and 1928, Modotti took hundreds of photographs of [Diego] Rivera's murals at the Secretariat of Public Education in Mexico City. Modotti's visual vocabulary matured during this period, such as her formal experiments with architectural interiors, blooming flowers, urban landscapes, and especially in her many beautiful images of peasants and workers during the depression.

In this article, I am going to treat Modotti as 1) photographer, 2) model for Weston, 3) model for Diego Rivera, 4) political activist, and 5) subject of poetry. My emphasis is on her as a photographer, but I can't neglect the other categories because she crosses all over several artistic disciplines.

Modotti modeled for Weston, both clothed and nude. See her portrait above for this article by Weston. Here is a link to the J. Paul Getty Museum, showing Weston's best-known nude photograph of her. Workers Parade, 1926.




I like this for the pattern, and for the social comment about worker solidarity.

Hands of Marionette Player, 1929.



I am very fond of photographs like this of workers' hands, telling the story of their work. The veins and strings are fascinating highlights. While this line of work requires sleeves rolled up, that also symbolizes membership in the social class of workers

Tehuantepec Type, c. 1929.



Modotti photographed the peoples of Mexico. Her work predates that of Graciela Iturbide, whom I covered in article no. 59 in March of this year. But I think I see a sensitive continuity of interest by a woman, about women, in both their photographs of women.

Stadium, Mexico City, c. 1927.




I wish I had shot something like this when I traveled to the antique stadia of Asia Minor, but although I tried, I never got the light so good as in this image. Note the light on the sides of the steps—Modotti had to shoot this at just the right time of day.

As I said at the beginning, Modotti crosses into other arts. Here are a few notes about that.


In her acting career Modotti appeared in several plays, operas, and silent films in the San Francisco Bay area in the late 1910s and early 1920s. She starred in the film *The Tiger's Coat*, 1920.

Below are two Diego Rivera murals for which she was a model.

The Abundant Earth, Mural, Diego Rivera, 1926.



Modotti modeled for the back-facing nude. Even her customary hairstyle is captured.



Modotti appears on the right, and Frieda Kahlo in the center, both quite recognizable. It is not accidental that they are wearing red shirts.

Modotti died unexpectedly at age 45 of congestive heart failure. Poet Pablo Neruda composed Modotti's epitaph, part of which can also be found on her tombstone, which also includes a relief portrait of Modotti by engraver Leopoldo Méndez:

Pure your gentle name, pure your fragile life, bees, shadows, fire, snow, silence and foam, combined with steel and wire and pollen to make up your firm and delicate being.

Alternative Photography: An interview with Malin Fabbri By Claudia Kidder

My artistic interests include photography and sequential art. About a month ago I started searching the internet for ways to combine these interests and came across alternative photography.

On Instagram, I connected with Malin Fabbri, editor of AlternativePhotography.com. Malin graduated with an M.A. in Design from Central St Martin's in London, and soon afterward, she started AlternativePhotography.com. Beginning in 1999, the website has been a source of information and research for alternative photographic processes. It now represents hundreds of artists. As the site's editor, Malin researches alternative photographic processes, runs workshops, and makes her own prints. She has done work for Time Magazine and CNBC Europe. Because she lives in Europe, we decided it would be easier to communicate via emails. I emailed Malin several questions, and below are her answers.

1.) What is alternative photography?

There are as many definitions of alternative photography as there are photographers. Some people play around with Photoshop or filters and label it "alternative". Some find obscure historical processes, mix chemicals, coat paper and develop in the sun and also call it "alternative". The website AlternativePhotography.com is in the latter category. The "real" name would be alternative photographic processes, but that is quite a mouthful, so we shortened it to AlternativePhotography.com. Another name could be 'historical photographic processes', but that only covers a section of the over 100 processes available. Some of these processes were developed as early as the 1840s, some are much newer, and some are yet to be discovered.

What is common for all of them is that you "get your hands dirty". You most likely mix your own chemicals, coat paper using a brush or a rod, develop a large format negative that is then contact printed in a UV lightbox or in the sun. Once the print has been developed - in chemicals or water - and dried, it can be toned to a different color or hue. What differentiates these processes from digital photography is the hands-on approach and the hours of labor and creativity that goes into a print.

2.) Why are people attracted to alternative photography?

Alternative photography has always been around, but I believe that, as digital photography has grown, there has been a huge backlash with a wave of people who want to "go analogue" instead. I quite often hear photographers say that digital is too fast, lacks thought and is less creative. Creating an alternative photographic print requires more planning and research, and during the hours it takes to make a print the creative process takes place and may change the outcome of the final print. New ideas may be implemented or simply "happy accidents" that were not meant to happen but happened by chance and actually enhanced the print. This is why a lot of people find it fun, creative, and fascinating.

3.) What is the best way to learn alternative photography?

Just try. Experiment. Have fun. The best way of course is if you know someone who can show you, but experimenting on your own works just as well. On the

AlternativePhotography.com website there are links to the community where there are many people willing to help, share and show if you ask a friendly question. There are people all over the world working with these processes. Maybe you can even find someone near you? Take a look here at how to connect:


4.) Is alternative photography used for exhibitions? For commercial photography? Fine arts?


Yes, all of those and more. Many artists host exhibitions - all over the world. It's also used for commercial photography when a certain quality is desired, but fine arts is where most prints are found. There is also a large community that make crafts using the processes. They print squares of fabric to make quilts, scarves, pillows, and t-shirts. Some print on metal making jewelry, some on glass or ceramics. There are many areas in which these printing processes can be applied and the only thing that is limiting the experience is imagination.
