PSA Rep Rap February 2023 By Dick Sprott





One of the PSA activities I greatly enjoy is a Phone photography study group. Study groups consist of 6 to 7 members with a similar interest, who post an image to the group once each month. Then the group members comment on each of the other images. Comments are intended to be helpful and supportive, not harsh, derogatory or unkind. This makes for a great way to get feed-back on ones work as well as make some like-minded photographer friends.

Recently, I sent an image of graffiti on the ruins of the Seneca Stone Cutting Mill, .2 miles off the C&O towpath, taken on the downstream side of the turning basin at mile 22.8. If you walk the towpath and haven't checked this out, give it a look. It is very interesting, both historically and contemporaneously for its graffiti. The image, which I have enhanced with on-phone postprocessing, and the original are shown below. Among the comments from my study group members was one I never anticipated. The comment was essentially that the member chose not to comment on my image because photographing graffiti was support for a criminal enterprise. Wow! That never crossed my mind. Thinking about it though, I could see his point even if I didn't completely agree. A little on-line research led me to an ethical issue I should have seen, given that I have commented on the ethics of photography of someone else's art in this column from time to time.

In any case, this comment from a study group compatriot is a nice example of the sort of interactions that take place in study groups. Thoughtful comments from fellow photographers can lead to positive outcomes. Thinking more broadly about our images is not only ethically responsible, it is interesting and can be fun.

Another of my group pointed out that some graffiti is not "criminal" since "some cities have set aside areas for graffiti as artistic expression." I have included my graffiti image here both to illustrate the discussion and because it can provide fodder for thoughts about how much a photographer needs to add to a straight shot of art to make it a legitimate new artistic expression. I'll let you decide in this instance.

# <u> March - Critique -</u>

<u>April - Macro -</u> Images that result from the use of close-up lenses, macro lenses, etc., where the magnification of the subject exceeds that obtained with a standard lens at its closest focusing distance. Close-up images of any object(s), created with or without a macro lens.

<u>May -Night Photography -</u> Night photography comprises photos taken between sunset and sunrise where the light of the sun is not visible. Night photos may be of the night sky, moon or other astrological phenomena, or other outdoor scenes that may not include the night sky in the photo but where it is obvious to the viewer that it is nighttime. Photos taken inside, but clearly showing evidence of nighttime (i.e. night sky seen through window) are also permissible. Some artificial light is acceptable but should not be a significant part of the overall composition. Images of anything obviously taken after dark.

# **Advanced Color**



#### First Place: "Bark Study No 2" By Doug Wolters

For a long time, I have been fascinated by the variety of textures & patterns visible in tree bark. I often walk in Sligo Creek Park, which is near my house. Even along the path, it offers many trees that I have photographed. This image is one of my favorites, even though I took it quite some time ago. Taken on a tripod with my old Rebel T2i, Canon 2.8L 100mm macro lens, 0.4sec at f/ 22, ISO 400.



#### Second Place: "White Sand Dune" By Gosia Klosek

This image was captured at the White Sands National Park. The shape of the ripple lines created by the wind was special for me. Increasing the contrast made the lines more pronounced. I also tried transforming the image to monochrome. But in color, the image is much more interesting due to some barely perceived reds and the many shades of blue. Nikon ISO 250 135mm f/10 1/800sec.



#### Third Place: "Seedhead of Goatsbeard" By Nancy Axelrod

This image was made in Provence, France. I was informed that this is a seedhead of Goatsbeard (whatever that is!). As I remember, we sprayed it lightly with water. It was placed inside of a vehicle in order to get a dark background and the blacks and contrast were enhanced in Lightroom. Sony a6400 camera with a Sony 18-105mm lens at 86mm (129mm equivalent), 1/250", f/22, ISO 400.



#### Third Place: "Cryptic Crystals" By Karen Goldman

This image is of a small cabochon of crazy lace agate from Mexico. Nikon D7200, 55 mm, 1 sec., f/16, ISO 100.

#### HM: "Fractal Romanesco" By Coriolana Simon

A vegetable related to broccoli and cauliflower – is an extraordinary example of geometry in nature. Its entire surface is made up of intricate spiral-formation cones, and sub-cones, and sub-sub-cones. Each one, from the largest down to the tiniest, has exactly the same logarithmic spiral

formation. The spirals form the pattern known in mathematics as the Fibonacci series – a pattern that occurs very often in nature. And because every spiral is

proportionally identical, the pattern is described as fractal. When I bought this Romanesco at Whole Foods, at first

glance it looked interesting. But, when I began exploring it with a macro lens, I found its repeating geometry far more fascinating. To represent it photographically, I thought the entire vegetable should be shown, and not just one small section enlarged. To complement the Romanesco's shape, I set it in a ceramic Japanese ikebana container that picked up the same kind of points and angles.

Photographed with a Canon 5D Mark II DSLR and a Canon 100mm macro lens. Exposure: 3.2 sec at f/29. Really Right Stuff tripod and ball head.

#### Second Place: "Last Standings" By Michael Tran

was taken on my Autumn photography trip in West Virginia, on my way back in the afternoon was cold and windy.I spotted a section of beautiful TEASEL along the country road. Tripod was using for this image on that windy day.



#### Third Place: "Tree and Wheat Field" By Nancy Axelrod

This image was made in Provence, France. I thought the undulating pattern of the wheat field was particularly well suited to black and white. Sony a6400 camera with a Sony 55-210mm lens at 202mm (303mm equivalent), 1/60", f/16, ISO 400. It was converted to B&W in Lightroom.

# Famous Photographers By Stephen Levitas #80 February 2023



Wolfgang Tillmans (1968-)



Wolfgang Tillmans—at last I get to write about a young contemporary photographer (relatively young—he is 54). I am happy to discuss someone who is not among the long dead. His work is in color, and very daring and innovative.

Tillmans has been a winner of major prizes, member and chair of foundations and committees, a professor of fine arts, and a guest museum curator. See the Wikipedia article for details. He is by no means merely a scrappy young photographer.

components of the medium: light, paper and chemistry."

Tillmans' famous Free Swimmer images were all created in the darkroom. No camera was used. There is a bit of word play in the title, Freischwimmer—this word can also be used to indicate the swimming ability of a person, that is, that they have passed their swim test. Hence, the Freischwimmer images are named with a tone of competence.
