

Speaking from experience, deciding on the category to compete is not necessarily obvious.


At the March meeting I heard a couple of individuals comment that they wished we had a program to help members learn how to create more competitive images. Voila! My chance to point out the advantages of PSA membership again. PSA offers just such a course. The course is titled, Creating Competitive Images. intended for photographers who know how to use their cameras but wish to fine tune their competitive eye. The course does not deal with the basics of camera operation. All course material is provided, there is nothing to buy. Competition is a major activity in PSA and camera clubs. The course will attempt to teach the norms necessary for making images which

may have a better chance for judge's acceptance. It is a structured course with six lessons and multiple exercises to be completed in six months. The instructors are Jon Fishback, and Scott Fowler. Both are well regarded instructors. Several members of NIHCC have taken Fishback's Image Analysis course and found it useful. So, if you are one of those looking for help in making your images more competitive this might be just the thing for you. As always, you do need to be a PSA member to enroll. #### Gosia Klosek

1st place Black and White Novice Unique

I decided on the word "unique" to indicate something which typically stands out. I used a magnifying glass to enlarge and bring this one word to the focus. I tried different focal lengths and decided on this one, which makes it clear which words are out of focus on the page of a dictionary. When processing the picture, I added exposure of about 1.5 stops to the area within the magnifying glass to make the area shine. I also cropped out most of the out of focus space. The judge commented about the leading line given by the position of the magnifying glass's handle placed in a corner of the picture. He felt the image had good exposure with the whites and blacks, and the subject was truly standing out. ISO 160, 50mm, f/8, 0.6 sec.

#### John Norvell

1st place Black and White Advanced Brussel Sprout Stalk

I took several still life photos of this stalk with all of it in focus, and then took this one with a shallow depth of field. Nikon D610, Nikon 24-120mm lens, 100mm, 1/2 sec., f/4, ISO 200.

2nd place Black and White Advanced
One Pale Pear

This still life of pears in a bowl was taken on a black cloth with side light from a window at sunset. I used focus stacking to make all parts sharp and Nik software to convert to black and white. Nikon D610, Nikon 24-120mm lens, 60mm, 4 sec., f/4, ISO 200.



## **Dale Lewis**1st place Advanced Color *Marbles*

This photo of marbles was taken on 2/25/2016 at 1 a.m. in my home. I positioned four colored marbles on a glass (16 in x 20 in) to get the reflection of the marbles. I adjusted exposure, vibrance, clarity, saturation, sharpening and luminance in Lightroom. Camera: Canon EOS 5D Mark III; Lens: EF 70-200 mm, F2.8L, IS II USM; Setting: 1/100 sec at 2.8 mm, ISO 800. A Kinko Extension Tube 12 mm was used to create a shallow depth of field.

2nd place Advanced Color The Odd Window

This photo was taken in the art district of Buenos Aires in bright sunlight. Fuji X-T1, Fuji 15-135mm lens, 18mm, 1/400 sec., f/11, ISO 200.



#### Gary McDavid

3rd place Advanced Color Freezing Rain

This red maple leaf was captured after a freezing rain at the onset of winter. It was rather dark so I used ISO 1000 to get the shutter speed up to 1/80 where I could hand hold it. My Canon 24-105mm lens has image stabilization which helped with the hand hold. Settings: 47mm, 1/80, f/8, ISO 1000.

#### Gosia Klosek

1st place Novice Color Apple and Oranges

I placed the fruit on a black cloth which also provided background. I used two desk lamps with the same bulbs. One shining set from the left to illuminate the basket of oranges, which resulted in most of the foreground part of the apple being in a shadow. I shone the second light just on the apple from the viewer's perspective. Then I edited two overexposed reflections on the shiny apple in Gimp before I cropped to the 8 by 10 format. The judge comments were about: the triangular arrangement of oranges which leads the viewer to the green apple outside of the basket; the black background which makes the colors stand out; and the sharpness of the picture. ISO200 100mm f/32 4.0 sec.





#### Gary McDavid

1st place Novice Color Digital  $Lone\ Aspen$ 

I took this image last fall near Telluride, CO. I was quite close to this beautiful Aspen and I took the picture with my telephoto lens, 70-200mm. As a result, I did not need to crop the image much, thus preserving detail in the image. Settings: 115mm, 1/500, f/4, ISO 100.



## John Norvell

2nd place Advanced Digital Lonesome Penguin

We were on a trip to Antarctica with National

Geographic/Lindblad and hiking along the rocky shoreline at this landing. The heavy clouds and fog began to lift showing distant snow-covered mountains bathed in bright light. I walked back to a rocky ledge to take a photo of the penguin colony mountains and bay. A single penguin appeared from nowhere and stood on the rock in front of me and looked toward and then all around. I made several photos, including this one where he is looking at the penguin colony to his left. This pose leads you to imagine that he was sad that he hadn't been invited to the penguin party, but he probably was just pausing to decide which way to go. Fuji X-T1, Fuji 15-135mm lens, 67mm, 1/160 Sec., f/11, ISO 800.

3rd place Advanced Digital

The Dark Tulip

This photo was taken in Longwood Gardens last spring. The shallow depth of field emphasized the sharpness of the dark tulip compared to the fuzzy white ones. Nikon D7100, 18-140mm lens, 60mm, 1/800 sec., f/5, ISO 200.



## Lisa Kruppa 1st place Novice Digital Way too Fresh

I took this photo using natural sunlight light. I started out just cleaning peas. Then I saw how the light was falling on the peas as I washed them and had to take a photo. Camera Nikon D750; Lens Sigma Marco 105; ISO 200; Exposure 1/200; Aperture 2.8



#### Fran Raab

2nd place Novice Digital Pumpkins

I carry my Panasonic Lumix Z540 with me at all times. I keep the competition categories in mind, and when I see something that might be a good shot for a competition I take several photos. I was at Whole Foods in October and saw several circular bushel baskets of different varieties of pumpkins. I arranged the orange ones that were in one basket, and took another variety from another basket and placed it with the orange ones to meet the criteria for "standing out in the crowd."



#### Gosia Klosek

3rd place Novice Digital First-hatched and its Sibs

This picture is just fun. I placed the carton near a window on a cloudy day so that there were no strong shadows. Light was flat and the only thing which truly stands out is a yellow chicken toy staring at you. I cropped the picture to get rid of extra white background space. ISO200 100mm f/25 1.6 sec.



## Travelogue, Galapagos Islands

#### Tuesday, April 19, 2016, 8:00 PM Community Room, Five Star Residence Jim Turner

Jim Turner will show some photographs from his recent visit to the Galapagos. The Galapagos are a group of 21 volcanic islands located in the Pacific Ocean about 600 miles west of Ecuador (South America). Despite



being on the Equator their climate is quite mild; average temperatures are about 80 degrees with a slightly warmer wet season and a slightly cooler dry season. The Galapagos are known for the high number of animals and plants

found there and nowhere else on earth. About 80% of the land birds, 97% of the reptiles and land mammals, more than 30% of the plants, and 20% of



the marine species in the Galapagos are unique to the islands. The Galapagos have



experienced relatively little human contact so the animals there live essentially as they always have. Favorites include the giant Galapagos tortoises, the marine iguanas, the flightless cormorants, and the Galapagos penguins – the only penguin species found in



the Northern Hemisphere. The islands are a part of Ecuador which has made them a national park in order to preserve this unique place for future visitors and for scientific study. Visitors are only allowed on prearranged tours with certified Galapagos quides.

#### Alphabetical Order:

**Abandoned Things** – Images of objects that have been abandoned or fallen into disuse (cars, building, factories, etc.)

Abstract Patterns or Textures - Images in which the object being photographed is not readily identifiable.

**Details, Details** – Images of objects (buildings, vehicles, animals, trees, etc.) in which details are emphasized (shapes, decorative elements, patterns, etc.) instead of showing the entire object.

**Macros** - Close-up images of any object(s), created with or without a macro lens.

**Night Scenes** – Images of anything obviously taken after dark.

Old Everything – Images that clearly depict the advanced age of humans, animals, or objects.

**People** – Images of living people, either alone (e.g., portraits), or in groups (e.g., sporting events, dances, etc.).

**Plants & Animals** – Images of living, non-human organisms (plants and animals), either wild, captive, or cultivated.

**Reflections** – Images in which a reflection is included as an important element.

**Shadows** – Images in which one or more shadows are important elements. The object creating the shadow may or may not be shown.

**Urban Images** – Images depicting scenes in an urban environment (e.g., buildings, roads, vehicles, etc.), either with or without people.

Water – Images in which the principal subject is water (anything from droplets to oceans), either stationary or in motion.
